

Faculty Update

SENIOR ASSOCIATE DEAN OF PEDIATRIC AND OBSTETRIC AND CLINICAL AFFAIRS APPOINTED

Ken Cox, MD, has been appointed senior associate dean for pediatric and obstetric clinical affairs. The new position was created by Philip Pizzo, MD, dean of the School of Medicine, to facilitate the ongoing expansion of clinical programs at Lucile Packard Children's Hospital and interactions between the school, Packard Children's Hospital and pediatric and obstetric faculty members.

Cox, professor of pediatrics and chief of the division of gastroenterology, will remain Packard's chief medical officer during his deanship. He will work closely with Norman Rizk, MD, senior associate dean for clinical affairs for the School of Medicine, to coordinate interactions about clinical programs and affairs.

"As chief medical officer for Packard Children's Hospital, I've worked to align the faculty practice with the hospital. My new position allows me to align it with the medical school as well," says Cox.

The upcoming expansion of Packard's clinical programs is due in part to the \$500 million fund-raising

campaign announced by the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health in November. A large portion of the fund has been earmarked for the creation of six Centers of Excellence aimed at facilitating collaboration between faculty members and clinicians in diverse areas of children's health.

"I am looking forward to working with the pediatric and obstetric faculty and helping them take advantage of the opportunities presented by the campaign," says Cox.

"Dr. Cox is a very experienced pediatrician who has led both academic and clinical programs. He has served in important leadership

positions in Packard Hospital and has won the respect and confidence of his peers and leaders, and he is the very best choice for this new position," says Pizzo.

Apgar Award for Sunshine

Phil Sunshine, MD, professor of pediatrics, emeritus, received the Apgar Award from the perinatal section of the American Academy of Pediatrics on Oct. 21, 2001 in

San Francisco. The honor is presented annually for major accomplishments in furthering the care of newborns and their mothers.

Sunshine is the founder and former director—from 1967 to 1989—of Stanford's neonatal intensive care unit. He is especially proud of his role in developing the Charles B. and

Ann L. Johnson Center for Pregnancy and Newborn Services at Lucile Packard Children's Hospital.

"I really consider my greatest accomplishment the advocacy of a perinatal center at Packard," says Sunshine. "It's the only one in the country connected to a major teaching hospital."
